

Sign Number	Climate Remembrance Statement
1	Populations now thriving, Mississippi kites first observed in Durham near here by local bird watchers — August 15, 2018
2	All downtown buildings powered by 100% renewable energy — July 20, 2040
3	Oyster River overtopped Route 108 during extreme rain event and astronomical high tide — May 19, 2034
4	Gazebo relocated due to recurring flooding caused by sea level rise — March 2057
5	UNH boathouse destroyed by storm surge during a Category 4 hurricane — September 24, 2032
6	Route 4 bridge elevated, enabling migration of salt marsh along Bunker Creek due to sea level rise — October 2020
7	Twelve houses near Great Bay converted to open space after sustaining repeated flood damage — July 2060
8	Wagon Hill closed for summer due to health concerns related to outbreak of ticks — June 8, 2044
9	Now reducing urban heat effect, elm trees planted along Main Street and Madbury Road — May 2026
10	Pettee Brook renamed Grand Brook by Town Council following significant flooding events — February 9, 2052
11	Summer season for UNH pool extended through Indigenous Peoples' Day to provide relief from fall heat — September 2058
